solar LED lighting for use in the outdoors is **SolLight**, a division of Oregon's **Simply Brilliant LLC**, producer of energy-efficient, environmentally sound products. Recently the company introduced the **LidLight**, a wireless, solar-powered LED light that can easily be fitted to most any dock box. The **LidLight** will automatically turn on and off when the box lid is opened and closed.

Bright ideas

Finally, while there are all kinds of products available for keeping docks clean and clutter-free, dock lighting can be used to create an attractive, inviting atmosphere while at the same time adding a degree of safety. And with the advances in solar LED and phosphorescent lighting it's possible to avoid the expense and danger of installing electrical wiring to run the lights.

One company that has dedicated itself to simple, inexpensive

SolLight also offers the solar-powered **RailLight**. Basically, these lights are similar to the solar-powered LED garden lights that have become so common, but come with two clamps for attaching the light to either tubular rails or flat edges up to two inches thick. Placed in an area with good sunlight, the **RailLight** will provide up to eight hours of light once the sun goes down. Lightweight and waterproof, the light sells for \$30.
